General Information



Purpose

The 27th Annual Pennsylvania Permanency Conference focuses on ways families and professionals from all aspects of the child welfare system can support one another and work together to achieve permanent connections for all children and youth.

The conference serves as a forum to train participants who will prepare children and families for their journey through the child welfare system towards permanency. The conference is designed to educate and support current and prospective foster and adoptive families, kinship care providers, permanent legal custodians, attorneys, child welfare professionals and others with a vested interest in permanency for children. The conference is a focal point for networking and sharing information to increase the knowledge base on the issues for children and youth in special needs adoptions and permanency.

The conference is designed for current and prospective foster and adoptive families as well as families providing other permanency options such as kinship care or permanent legal custodianship, attorneys, mental health professionals, independent living professionals, public and private agency professionals and the children on behalf of whom they work.

Conference Opening



The Honorable G. Helen Whitener Superior Court of Washington, Pierce County

Judge Whitener is active locally, nationally and internationally. She presents talks about human rights, access to justice and the responsibility of the judiciary to ensure the rights of all that appear before the court to basic dignity and respect in judicial proceedings.

In 2015, at the request of the U.S. Embassy, Judge Whitener visited her home country of Trinidad and Tobago to speak about human rights. In 2017, Judge Whitener adapted and organized a Color of Justice event for her court through the National Association of Women Judges. The success of this event compelled the Washington State Superior Court Judge's Association to sponsor three more events throughout Washington. Judge Whitener also gave a TedxPortofSpain talk titled "Claiming your Identity by understanding your Self-Worth."

Judge Whitener has served on the Pierce County, Washington Superior Court since she was appointed in 2015 by Governor Jay Inslee. Judge Whitener previously served as a judge on the Washington State Board of Industrial Insurance Appeals and as a pro-



tem judge in Pierce County District Court as well as the Tacoma Municipal Court. Prior to becoming a judge, she worked as a prosecutor and a defense attorney.

Judge Whitener is co-chair of the Washington State Minority and Justice Commission, Chair of the Washington State Superior Court Judges' Association — Equity and Fairness Committee and serves on the Board of Directors of the International Association of LGBT Judges. Judge Whitener is also a member of the International Association of Women Judges, the National Association of Women Judges and the American Judges Association, the Washington State Office of Civil Legal Aid Oversight Committee, the Washington Women Lawyers and is a judicial member of the Advisory Council for the QLaw Association of Washington.

In her keynote speech, Judge Whitener will discuss the importance of understanding implicit and explicit bias, cultural competency and why diversity, equity and inclusion is important in the adoption process.

Judge Whitener will share the story of Anna, a disabled child from China who was adopted by white American parents. This keynote is meant to inspire and encourage young children to embrace their differences while pursuing their dreams.

Recognition Banquet

Teresa Miller has served as Secretary of the Department of Human Services (DHS) since August 2017. Child Care and Teen Registration

We are pleased to provide on-site child care, as well as activities for older children.* Additional forms and payments are required if you are requesting child care. A Child/Teen Care Registration Form (included below) must be completed for EACH child and teen who is participating in the sponsored activities. **Child/teen care is offered on a first-come basis. The deadline for child/teen care registration is May 3, 2019.** All child/teen care registrations received before May 3, 2019 will receive an informational confirmation packet. Permission forms from this packet must be filled out and brought with you to the conference. **Drop-in care is NOT available.** Children and teens must be preregistered to receive care.

Child Care and Teen Activities

Ages infant through 11: Child care is a supervised program that includes special activities. The rate is \$50 per child for the entire conference.

Ages 12 through 17: Teen care is a supervised program that includes a workshop and other special activities. Teens must be no older than 17 at the time of the conference. The rate is \$50 per youth for the entire conference.

Meals: Daily snacks, Wednesday dinner, Thursday breakfast, lunch, Family Fun Night dinner and Friday breakfast will be provided. Parents whose children are unable to eat table food must provide food (e.g., formula, baby food, bottles, special diets, allergies, etc.).
